



**Please Support the Protecting Access to Ground Ambulance
Medical Services Act of 2023**

Request

Please support S.1673/H.R. 1666, the Protecting Access to Ground Ambulance Medical Services Act of 2023, introduced by Senators Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV) and Susan Collins (R-ME) in the Senate and Representatives Brad Wenstrup (R-OH) and Terry Sewell (D-AL) in the House. This legislation would temporarily extend additional reimbursement for ground ambulance services until the Medicare Ambulance Fee Schedule is reformed. Without the extension of these ground ambulance “add-ons,” many ambulance service organizations will not be able to continue serving their communities.

Background

Congress originally extended the current Medicare add-on payments through December 31, 2022, when the review of the Medicare cost data collection survey and subsequent MedPAC analysis was expected to be complete. However, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) delayed the first two rounds of data collection because of the pandemic. As part of the FY2023 Omnibus Appropriations Bill (P.L. 117-328), Congress extended the add-on payments until December 31, 2024. Extending the current add-on payments for an additional three years, through December 31, 2027, will allow enough time for the cost collection data to be gathered and analyzed so that an informed, long-term solution to the chronic underfunding of the ambulance fee schedule can be adopted.

Years of below-cost Medicare reimbursement have hampered efforts by ambulance services to hire new staff, update equipment, and continue to provide life-saving services in their communities. Ambulance services have closed or been forced to lengthen response times because of the stresses on their systems. Congress must extend and even increase the percentages of these additional payments in order to help preserve access to critical 9-1-1 emergency and urgent interfacility ground ambulance services.

H.R. 1666 would extend the current add-on payments of 2% urban, 3% rural, and 22.6% in super rural areas. Similarly, S.1673 extends the add-on payments for three years, but at a higher level of 3.4% urban, 4.3% rural, and 26.7% for super rural areas.
