Honoring Our Past - Advancing Our Future

Remarks of Bruce Evans, NAEMT President

Welcome members and guests to the 2021 NAEMT General Membership Meeting! We understand that for many of you, it was a challenge to take time out to be in Atlanta, and we greatly appreciate your efforts to be with us this evening.

Overcoming challenge... and perseverance... are defining traits of our profession and workforce. From responding to the public health emergency, national disasters, MCIs, an epidemic of mental health crises and drug overdoses, to violence against our practitioners and the resulting stress and impact to our own wellbeing... Our profession has navigated these challenges and persevered for our patients.

Our response to help our patients and communities has been unparalleled. We have been put to the test over and over again through the COVID-19 pandemic, civil unrest and natural disasters. EMS is serving as a pillar of strength and a leadership voice for our communities.

As a representative of our association, I am humbled and honored to be with you this evening to share the body of work that our incredible members have achieved. On behalf of the NAEMT Board of Directors – we thank you and all our members across our United States and territories, and in 121 other countries – for your membership and for your support of NAEMT.

COVID-19 and the variants that have emerged remain a global crisis. The medical, economic, and social scope of the crisis has brought about unprecedented changes to our society and in healthcare. For EMS, the pandemic has brought a greater awareness within our communities and the healthcare system of the role that EMS plays in population health, and an expansion of services including administration of vaccinations and antibodies, transport to destinations other than the ED, telehealth facilitation, and treatment in place. The pandemic has also brought an exponential increase in workforce stress and illness, compounded by a shortage of personnel never before experienced.

And, we lost many of our colleagues in the line of duty deaths from crashes to shootings to coronavirus. More than 160 Paramedics and EMTs in the U.S. have died to date in the line-of-duty during the pandemic. We must honor and remember our brothers and sisters for their sacrifice. We owe it to them to do everything in our power to make sure that communities and elected officials recognize their sacrifice and provide EMS with the resources needed to protect our workforce.

In July, the National EMS Memorial Service was held in Arlington, Virginia, to recognize and honor the sacrifices of our colleagues who died in the line of duty during 2019 and 2020, as the ceremony for the 2019

line of duty deaths could not be held in person last year due to the pandemic. To pay tribute to those brave Paramedics and EMTs who made the ultimate sacrifice in service to their patients during that time, Rachel Tester from the National EMS Memorial Service will lead us in a prayer for our fallen heroes.

Thank you, Rachel. These EMS heroes will never be forgotten. Their sacrifice inspires us to make our EMS profession better — and safer — for our practitioners and for the patients we serve.

In accordance with our bylaws, the NAEMT President provides an annual report on the achievements of our association at the General Membership Meeting. I am proud to share with you the highlights of our association's achievements so far this year.

- On March 12, the American Rescue Plan was signed into law. This legislation included waiver authority to allow Medicare to reimburse ground ambulance services for treatment in lieu of transport during the public health emergency. The law also increased the Provider Relief Fund by \$8.5 billion, targeting the money to rural providers and suppliers, including ground ambulance services. NAEMT partnered with the AAA, IAFC, and IAFF in leading the effort to get these EMS provisions included in the final legislation.
- We have been advocating for laws to help EMS agencies and personnel recover from the pandemic and build back their resiliency, including:
 - o Fiscal Year 2022 Funding for SIREN Grants
 - o Extending Medicare add-on payments for 5 additional years
 - the EMS Counts Act of 2021, introduced in the House as 2354, and a Senate bill was just introduced by Senators Casey and Collins in the Senate.
 - Making permanent the COVID reimbursement waivers on treatment in place, transport to alternate destinations, and telehealth facilitation.
- To help EMS agencies prepare for cost collection, we developed and published the NAEMT CMS
 Cost Collection Guide. This new FREE guide helps EMS agencies gain the full scope of costs
 involved in operating their ground ambulance service. We also have been working with CMS to ensure
 that the cost data collection schedule, delayed because of the pandemic, will support accurate data
 being transmitted to CMS.
- Through published comments and positions, we spoke out on issues important to our profession and our patients:
 - NAEMT collaborated with the AAA, IAFC, and IAFF to express deep concern to congressional leaders with the impending 2% Medicare sequestration cut scheduled to take effect on April 1,

2021. Congress voted to delay Medicare payment cuts for the rest of the year—a big win for all Medicare providers, including EMS.

- NAEMT, IAFF, and IAFC requested HHS to ensure hospitals are complying with the infectious disease notification requirements under the Ryan White Act, including notification of exposure to COVID-19.
- NAEMT supported the U.S. Department of Transportation recommendations and opposed legislation that would increase the legal size or weight limits of trucks.
- NAEMT, along with AAA, the Congressional Fire Services Institute, IAFC, IAFF, and the National Volunteer Fire Council urged HHS Secretary Becerra to distribute the remaining monies from the Provider Relief Fund to help offset costs to EMS due to our pandemic response. HHS announced in September that the remaining funds would be distributed.

I submitted written testimony on behalf of NAEMT to the House Appropriations Committee to raise awareness of the critical funding shortfall of EMS in communities; and requested funding to enable EMS agencies to ensure that our professionals are provided a safe, healthy, and respectful work environment, and that their EMS agency can effectively serve their communities.

- We sent a letter to the CMS Administrator requesting that CMS wait for the recommendations from the Ground Ambulance Advisory Committee on surprise billing, as Congress stipulated, and opposing language in the CMS Interim Final Rule on the No Surprises Act that expands the scope of the regulations to include ground ambulance services.
- We joined with 7 other national EMS organizations in a statement encouraging local healthcare systems, government leaders, EMS agency leaders, regulatory officials, and the EMS workforce to collaboratively develop and implement multi-disciplinary strategies that protect and preserve the EMS workforce.
- NAEMT joined with NAEMSP and NASEMSO on a statement on the clinical care and restraint
 of agitated or combative patients by EMS practitioners.
- And, we updated our position statement on EMS as an Essential Public Function originally published in 2011. This updated version includes new references, highlights the role of EMS in our nation's pandemic response, and reaffirms the need for EMS to be recognized and financially supported by all levels of government.
- NAEMT hosted its first virtual EMS On The Hill event on April 12-16. This year, 292 EMS
 professionals from all 50 states, D.C., and Puerto Rico attended meetings with 95 Senate offices and
 148 House offices to discuss key EMS issues. We are planning to return to D.C. for EMS On The Hill

Day on April 6 with our pre-hill briefing on April 5.

- We continue to grow the NAEMT EMS Political Action Committee or PAC. While the pandemic has made it more difficult to solicit contributions to our PAC, we do continue to add funds. We ask all of our members to help us grow the PAC so that we can support federal legislators who champion EMS in the House and Senate. Even a \$20 contribution makes a difference. At the Member Reception right after this meeting, there will a PAC table when you can learn more about the PAC and make a contribution.
- We partnered with ACEP to promote the 46th annual National EMS Week on May 16-22. This year's
 theme, THIS IS EMS: Caring for Our Communities, highlighted the important contributions of EMS
 practitioners in safeguarding the health, safety, and well-being of our communities. During the week,
 we highlighted the tremendous work of EMS practitioners across the country through our social media
 platforms.
- The results of our national survey on the impact of COVID-19 on EMS agencies and personnel were published and provided to all members of Congress, federal agencies, national organizations, and the media. The results provided a national snapshot of the continued impact of the pandemic on EMS agency operations and personnel.
- NAEMT partnered with Genentech to launch a Public Service Announcement campaign to urge the
 public to call 9-1-1 when they or someone they know is experiencing symptoms of stroke. We also
 partnered with FirstNet on a video to promote first responder resilience.

Moving on to education... Amidst the pandemic, NAEMT faculty, authors and medical directors have continued to work to provide our workforce with the very best continuing education available. We have witnessed so many outstanding examples of our faculty making extraordinary efforts to ensure that their students are receiving the education they need. We thank NAEMT's global faculty for their great efforts.

- NAEMT published new education curricula to strengthen the knowledge and skills of EMS practitioners:
 - The first three courses in NAEMT's Community Paramedicine course series were
 published. Motivational Interviewing, Hospice and Palliative Care, and Wellness and
 Nutrition are now available for all NAEMT training centers to conduct. These courses are all
 approved for CAPCE credit.
 - First On the Scene, a new course designed to teach the general public basic emergency response to life-threatening emergencies until EMS arrives on the scene, was published.

Developed in partnership with the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC), this course includes didactic instruction and hands-on skill stations to teach participants how to access help in the event of a life-threatening emergency and what to do until EMS arrives. All NAEMT training centers and other qualified members are eligible to offer this course.

- The AMLS 3rd edition Refresher and Hybrid courses were published.
 And, we published a new, very timely chapter on Behavioral Emergencies for the 3rd edition.
- And, the 4th edition of Emergency Pediatric Care has published. This new edition has a brandnew Course Manual for students, new case studies, and new patience simulations. The 16hour course is offered in a traditional classroom format, in a combined live virtual/classroom format, or as a hybrid online interactive/classroom format. In addition, there is a new 8-hour EPC refresher course as well.
- We continued to offer our members FREE CE webinars presented by top EMS experts on topics such as the management of abdominal complaints, reading EKGs in the prehospital environment, burn trauma, prehospital stroke management, strengthening EMS agency and practitioner resilience, and a three-part series on telehealth. All are available to members at any time via the Member Portal on the NAEMT website.
- Today, we held a fantastic World Trauma Symposium as an in-person and live streamed event. Over 300 practitioners, physicians and educators participated in the event to learn from global leaders in prehospital trauma care. Thank you to Dr. Warren Dorlac Dr. Meg Morgan for developing such a tremendous trauma program.
- NAEMT provides EMS scholarship opportunities to our members to assist them in furthering their EMS education. Thousands of dollars in scholarships are awarded each year for EMRs to become EMTs, for EMTs to become Paramedics, and for Paramedics to advance their EMS education. We also partner with Columbia Southern University to offer a scholarship to one member each year of up to 60 credit hours towards one online degree program.
- We also award scholarships to people interested in a career in EMS:
 - Through the NAEMT Foundation, scholarships up to \$1,000 each are offered. This year the Foundation awarded scholarships to eight individuals to begin their career in EMS.
- We also offer scholarships for individuals from underserved communities up to \$1,250 each for them to become an EMT or Paramedic.

- NAEMT also rolled out many new member benefits, including:
 - A 25% discount on stethoscopes from Eko.
 - Discounted rates for the EMS Wellness Support Program from healthPERX, including FREE
 Telemedicine and Behavioral Health services.
 - NPPGov Group Purchasing Organization membership with exclusive discounts for NAEMT members.
 - And at the beginning of this year, we upgraded your existing Amazon account access to include Business PRIME benefits! This has resulted in well over \$30,000 in savings to our members for shipping costs so far this year!
- This year, we also held our first virtual member listening sessions to allow members to share their thoughts, ideas, and concerns with their regional directors. In addition to regularly surveying our members, we will continue to offer listening sessions in the future as another way for members to connect with their elected Board.

These are just some of the highlights of the tremendous work being accomplished by the hundreds of members who volunteer their time to these projects and keep our association moving with forward momentum. The active engagement of our members is NAEMT's greatest asset. With your continued support, we will continue to advance the EMS profession. It is my honor to serve you. Thank you sincerely for your support!

Although the program never got off the ground during Jim's lifetime, many of us who knew Jim believed in his vision for such a program. NAEMT has long recognized the need for an EMS leadership mentor program, and so I recruited an outstanding team of EMS leaders to develop a program for approval by the NAEMT Board.

This new program – the EMS Lighthouse Leadership Program – will pair experienced EMS leaders with EMS professionals who desire to advance into a leadership position. Once matched, the EMS mentors will work with their assigned mentees to identify their goals, and develop and implement a leadership plan to help their mentees prepare to advance their careers. Mentors will provide mentees with guidance and feedback through regular virtual one-on-one meetings over a period of 18 months. Those who complete the program will attend a Lighthouse Leadership graduation that will be held in conjunction with EMS World Expo. This new program will be open to EMS professionals from all sectors of EMS. The application process will begin in January 2022. Look for more information about this program on our web site and in our digital and print newsletters.

Thank you to the committee for developing such a promising program and helping to give wings to Jim's vision.

The safety of EMS practitioners has always been a priority for NAEMT. It became even more critical over the last two years as we saw so many in our profession fall ill from COVID, and tragically, too many of them died from the virus. NAEMT and ACEP partner on an award to recognize an EMS agency for its outstanding work to protect the safety of our practitioners. This award is generously sponsored by Horton Emergency Vehicles. Joining me to present this year's Safety in EMS Award is Dr. Doug Kupas representing ACEP and Lance Randolph from Horton Emergency Vehicles.

It is our honor to announce the 2021 recipient of the national Safety in EMS Award... **HealthNet Aeromedical Services of Charleston, West Virginia!**

With us today representing HealthNet is Clinton Burley, President and CEO, Jeffrey White, Director of Safety, and Justin Koper, Safety Officer. Gentlemen, please join us on stage to accept your award.

HealthNet Aeromedical Services has successfully implemented several strategies to support a Culture of Safety in their agency. They have:

- An internal, full-time safety department focusing solely on the day-to-day development, implementation, and oversight of safety-related initiatives;
- In-house emergency vehicle operator training within six months of an employee's hire date for those with previous EVOC training to reduce the risk of motor vehicle collisions;
- Fleet-wide use of video telematics in all ambulances to protect employees from potential liability in events that occur through no fault of their actions;
- Daily pre-shift fatigue assessments, pre-transport risk assessments for long distance transports, preshift crew rest requirements, and maximum duty length limits; and
- All EMS personnel complete the NAEMT EMS Safety Course within 6 months of hire and biennially afterwards.
